McAuliffe's Drama Club isn't only about the actors. It's about the Backstage Crew too.

What is backstage? Backstage crew is a separate part of the Drama Club consisting of the people who move the props throughout the show. If you have ever been to a play and noticed a specific setting in one scene and then a different scene after the curtains close or the lights are dark, that's the work of the backstage crew. As a member of the backstage crew, students have to learn all of the scenes of the play, and know when and where the prop changes occur.

How can McAuliffe students join Backstage Crew? To join backstage crew, interested students must go to the first meeting of McAuliffe's Drama Club. Interested students must then answer a questionnaire that is provided at the first meeting asking why you would like to join backstage. The Drama Club advisors read through the potential members, and select a group of students. *Most* of the students who hand in a form are chosen, but no one is guaranteed a spot. Señora Gittler's posts the final Backstage Crew list on her classroom door.

What are some other cool things about being in Drama Club and Backstage Crew? Is there really an opportunity to go to New York and see a play? A cool thing about Drama Club and Backstage Crew is that, at the end of each year, members get the chance to see a Broadway show! 


Robotics Club Tournament By Madison Patterson



DONALD J. Trump was sworn in as the 45th President of the United States on Friday, January 20, 2017. Trump, a Republican from New York, took the oath of office from Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts at the U.S. Capitol in Washington, DC. Slovenia-native Melania Trump, the new First Lady, stood by her husband as he took the oath. Former Indiana Governor Mike Pence was also sworn in as the new Vice President. Outgoing President Barack Obama was on hand for the transfer of power and was joined in attendance by former Presidents George W. Bush, William J. Clinton and Jimmy Carter.

Since the Inauguration ceremony, the new President has been focusing on his cabinet, as several nominees have been confirmed by the U.S. Senate. Among those confirmed are Rex Tillerson (Secretary of State), James Mattis (Secretary of Defense), Steven Mnuchin (Secretary of the Treasury), Jeff Sessions (Attorney General) and Betsy DeVos (Secretary of Education), who was narrowly confirmed by a tie-breaking vote by Vice President Pence, 51-50.

Now the real work has begun as the new President must grapple with numerous domestic and foreign issues that have been difficult for both parties to solve. The United States will certainly be watching closely for the next four years as President Donald J. Trump attempts to implement his policies as President of the United States.
