Update: Mask Mandates

With school mask mandates coming to an end, the Jackson school district has elected an optional mask policy for students and staff beginning March 7th.

The school mask mandate set in place by New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy is coming to an end on March 7th. At that point masks in school will no longer be required in the Jackson school district, but will be optional for students and staff.

While it will be a relief for students to no longer have to hear the "pull your mask up" mantra adopted by many of the staff, it will also come as a relief for staff to no longer have to monitor that masks are being worn properly, or worn at all.

As the option to wear a mask is still in place, it is up to the students and staff to keep in mind that some people are not ready to discard this layer of protection just yet. Please be understanding that masks will still be worn by some people and that is a personal decision that no one should question or make comments on. Everyone has the right to feel safe and comfortable.

Masks will become optional, but there are still some exceptions to consider. As stated in the district email sent out to staff and district families, the exceptions are:

Masks must still be worn on school buses, due to a federal mandate

from the U.S. Department of Transportation. If and when this federal requirement is lifted, the district will not require masks to be worn on school buses. Any student or staff member who has tested positive for COVID must wear a mask in school for days 6-10 following the onset of their symptoms. This is in accordance with CDC guidance for positive individuals.

Even though the mask mandate is coming to an end, not every district in New Jersey has decided to lift their own district's mandate. As of the writing of this article, students and staff in Hillside, Plainfield, Camden and Newark school districts will still be required to wear masks in the schools. Other districts said they are surveying their communities before

making a decision whether to lift the mask mandates or not.
