

French Toast Sticks (Makes 15 Sticks) - Prep Time: 8 minutes Cook Time: 12 minutes (nut free)

#### Ingredients

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 Cup whole milk, rice or almond
- 1/2 Tsp cinnamon
- 2 Tsp honey
- Pinch of kosher salt
- 5 Slices of Bread, trim edges and cut into 1 inch sticks
- 1 Tbsp. butter

#### **Preparation**

- 1. In a shallow bowl, whisk the eggs, milk, cinnamon, honey and salt until combined.
- 2. Dip each bread stick in the egg mixture until each side is coated with the mixture.
- 3. Heat a sauté pan or griddle over medium heat with 1 tbsp. of butter and cook for 3 minutes on each side until golden and cooked through.
- 4. Serve with honey or maple syrup.


