Through education, mentoring and outreach, the STAMP NJ program encourages students with learning disabilities to:

STAMP LEADERS

- The STAMP NJ Leaders are a group of middle, high school, and post-secondary students who speak about their own learning disabilities, the importance of self-advocacy, and the value of assistive technologies.
- Student Leaders will also mentor other students.
- Leaders will present at national and regional conferences, colleges and universities, as well as to school districts.


As a student in your class, you should know

- I'm COLOR BLIND
- I have some **HEARING LOSS**
- I'm DYSLEXIC and DYSGRAPHIC



The Facts About Dyslexia

- No correlation to intelligence
- Most common reason for reading, writing, & spelling problems
- 1 in 5 people are dyslexic
- Affects everyone differently
- Will not outgrow
- Do not see letters backward or upside-down



How I Learn Best

- LISTENING to text, instead of reading it, allows me to FOCUS on the content and keep pace with my peers
- EXTRA TIME allows me to ORGANIZE my ideas and encode/decode words
- **SPEECH-TO-TEXT** software allows me to easily get my thoughts on paper
- LISTENING and EXPERIENCING new information allows me to understand and make connections rather than STRUGGLING to capture accurate notes and missing much of the content



Proposed Classroom Accommodations

- Extra time on tests and assignments
- Use of speech-to-text software
- Access to audiobooks/electronic textbooks
- Study guides and copies of class notes
 - Difficulty taking accurate notes while listening to understand
- No penalty for spelling errors
- Long or complex directions read to me

- ask questions when I don't understand
- seek help when I need it
- use technology to keep pace with my peers
- share my experiences and help others who are struggling to learn

How You Can Help Me

- Be open to my different way of learning and use of technology
 - Allow me to use audiobooks and speech-to-text technology
- Allow time outside of class to start or complete assessments
- Allow opportunities to be re-taught concepts when I am confused
- Give **advanced notice** or an **extension** on assignments that require a large amount of reading or writing

Mentorship Program

- The goal of the Mentorship Program is to provide the students with the information, tools, and confidence that they need to be able to advocate for themselves in and out of school.
- They will get to know other students who share their struggles, which will hopefully make them feel less alone in their challenges.
- They will also learn from older students who have faced the same challenges and can offer support and hope in many areas.



Mentorship Program

- 7 sessions
- Once a week for approximately 45 minutes per session
- STAMP Mentor(s) and a small group of Mentees
- Focus on self-advocacy

SESSION 1: INTRO TO STAMP


MENTORS:

AFTER INTRODUCTIONS, HAVE STUDENTS CREATE A "WHO AM I?" PROJECT. ALLOW EACH STUDENT TO EXPLAIN THEIR DRAWING.

OPTIONAL GAME: USING THE WHITE BOARD, PLAY 2 TRUTHS AND A LIE!

ART PROJECT INSTRUCTIONS: ALL ABOUT ME I ON A BLANK PAGE IN YOUR NOTEBOOK, WRITE YOUR NAME IN THE CENTER. USE YOUR FAVORITE COLORS.

2. DRAW OR WRITE AROUND YOUR NAME THE THINGS THAT REPRESENT YOU! FAVORITE FOODS, HOBBIES, PETS, CARTOONS, PLACES TO VISIT, SPORTS.





Mentoring

- Some of the student leaders have met with younger students virtually to provide support and answer questions.
- The student leaders can connect with the younger students and empathize with them in ways that parents and teachers may not be able to.
- Mentoring is especially helpful at transition times, such as:
 - Elementary School to Middle School
 - Middle School to High School
 - High School to College



Skills

- School can present challenges to all students, and especially those with learning differences. Learn from other students about the importance of:
- Self-advocacy
- Support (who is on your team?)
- Assistive Technology
- Study Skills
- Time Management



SELF-ADVOCACY

- Know what your challenges are and how they affect you
- Find out what services and programs are available
- Know what your accommodations are before classes start (IEP or 504 Plan, for example)
- Get extra support for any challenges
- Wellness: Take care of your physical and mental health

SUPPORT

Build a team of people who can help

Parents

Siblings

- Friends
- Tutors
- Other people you can rely on

Get to know your teachers and go to them if you have questions or need help

ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

- Speech-to-text
- Text-to-speech
- Quizlet
- Audiobooks
- Alternate format textbooks
- Keep trying new things

STUDY SKILLS

- Find out what works for you
- Know what hours are best for you to study
- Tutors
- Study groups
- Note-taking skills

TIME MANAGEMENT

- Have a set schedule
- Lean how to organize and plan for each day
- Use a large calendar to keep track of all assignments and commitments (assignments, meetings, practices, events, etc.)
