Background of State Aid Cuts

In 2018, NJ passed a law known as "S2" that drastically impacted the amount of state aid we receive.

The cuts are applied in phases, and each year we endure them we are forced to make harder and harder choices. This compounds!

What We are Facing This Year

The Impact of S2 to the Jackson School District

2018-2019 = **\$1.3 million**

2019-2020 = **\$2.3 million**

2020-2021 = **\$3.5 million**

2021-2022 = **\$4.3 million**

2022-2023 = **\$4.6 million**

2023-2024 = **\$2.5 million**

2024-2025 = \$806,460

\$19.3 million will be lost in state aid over 7 years

Impact of State Aid Loss for This Year

State Aid Cuts

2018-2019 = \$1.3 million

2019-2020 = \$2.3 million

2020-2021 = \$3.5 million

2021-2022 = \$4.3 million

2022-2023 = \$4.6 million

2023-2024 = \$2.5 million

2024-2025 = \$806,460

The maximum we can increase our tax levy is 2 % Last year that figure was \$1.79 million

FYI:

To put this into perspective:

- We have lost **\$16 MILLION** in S2 State Aid Cuts over the past 5 years
- For 2023-2024, we are losing ANOTHER \$2.5 MILLION
- Due to these losses, our surplus/free balance we rollover from year to year has dissolved

AND we still need to address annual increases to:

- Our contractual responsibilities above 2%
- Gas prices
- Increasing insurance premiums
- Tuition increases outside of our control
- Transportation cost increases in the millions
- The impact of the current economy rising costs for just about everything

Budget Challenges: The Perfect Storm

- Devastating S2 cuts year after year and another \$2.5 million cut to state aid for 23-24
- Depleted surplus/free balance to roll over
- Increases in services needed for students (ELL, etc.)
 - Currently = 453 ELL students (5.97% of student population)
 - 5 years ago = 181 ELL students (2.22% of student population)
- Increases in nonpublic transportation costs
 - Currently 4,331 students qualify for nonpublic transportation/AIL
 - 5 years ago = 667 students qualified for nonpublic transportation or AIL
 - In one year, our budget allocation for non-public transportation went from \$1.3 million to \$4.5 million.
- Increased costs of just about everything due to the economy changes (gas, electric, food, supplies, etc.) and contractual salary increases above 2% tax cap
