

## Johnson School Aquaponics Lab

**W**hen students visit the H.C. Johnson Library, they are entering a classroom that truly meets the needs of 21st-century learners. It is a place in which students feel welcome to create, explore, research, and collaborate with one another. Whether it be through the use of traditional resources, or through technology, all students have equal access to information and the skills necessary to locate it.

As students become prepared to be future ready, addressing core competencies such as digital literacy, problem-solving, and critical thinking skills becomes imperative. Lessons for students in grades K-5 seek to address those needs through the integration of technology and through project-based learning opportunities.

The brand new Aquaponics Lab is a most welcomed addition to the library program. This lab gives Johnson students a unique opportunity to engage in project-based learning in a real-life setting. It also allows both the librarian and classroom teacher to collaborate on lessons that ultimately strengthen the partnership between the library and the classroom.

Students in grades three through five were introduced to aquaponics after completing initial coursework designed to help them locate information in the library. Once completed, students discussed the history of aquaculture, examined the differences between aquaponic and hydroponic farming, and investigated how aquaponic gardening may be the key to a more sustainable future.

Through hands-on, project-based learning opportunities students have taken ownership of the aquaponic garden and have learned more about environmental stewardship. Future lessons will focus on the science behind aquaponics and as well as

strengthening community relationships when the students and staff begin to work with the Jackson Food Pantry.

Enthusiasm for this project can only be eclipsed by the real impact it has on the school community as a whole. This is the beginning of a new chapter for the library program, library pun intended, and everyone can't wait to see where the future takes Johnson School! ■





## Holman School Students’ Science Unit Builds Success!

**T**he fifth grade students in Mrs. Majors’ class at Holman Elementary School have been excited about their first Science Unit of the new school year. During this time, the students learned about the different states of matter, physical and chemical changes, and different types of bridges. Students were challenged with the task of creating a bridge that could span 30 cm and support 5 pounds for 10 seconds using popsicle sticks, toothpicks, straws, and binder clips. Working collaboratively in small groups, students created scientific group names and began working through the Design Process in order to accomplish the task. Every student in the class was eager to complete the challenge, and looked forward to the Science period of each school day. After the first trial, all four groups successfully created a bridge that was able to support the weight for the given time limit. During the Redesign phase, students made adjustments and changes to their bridges in order to support additional weight without collapsing. Overall, the unit was extremely successful and every student thoroughly enjoyed the hands-on learning and reflecting on the process in their Science Journals. ■
