Participation

- a. Students will receive credit for completing and contributing to classroom activities

Assessment: Tests, Quizzes, Essays, and Projects

- a. Quizzes will be announced and unannounced; it is best always to be prepared.
- b. Tests will be announced at least **two** days before the day students will be required to take them. If you are absent on test day, you must take the test upon return.
- c. School policy states that you have <u>five</u> days to make up missed tests. Please do not wait that long.
- d. Late projects and/or essays will not be accepted.

Attendance

Reading

- a. We will be covering the following:
 - i. Beowulf
 - a. Tells the story of the Scandinavian hero Beowulf, who gained fame as a young man by vanquishing the monster Grendel and Grendel's mother; later, as an aging king, he kills a dragon but dies soon after, honored and lamented. *There is strong language, sexual topics, and death throughout the novel. We will be watching the film after the novel.
 - ii. The Canterbury Tales (The Wife of Bath's Tale)
 - a. Provides insight into the role of women in the Late Middle Ages and was probably of interest to Chaucer himself, for the character is one of his most developed ones, with her Prologue twice as long as her Tale. *We will be watching the film "A Knight's Tale" after the novel.

iii. The Rime of the Ancient Mariner

a. Tale of a man on a voyage by ship who, in one impulsive and heinous act, changes the course of his life and death.

iv. Frankenstein

a. Frankenstein, or The Modern Prometheus, is an 1818 novel that tells the story of Victor Frankenstein, a young scientist who creates a creature in a scientific experiment. *There is strong language, sexual topics, and death throughout the novel. We will be watching the film after the novel.

v. "Dead Poets Society"

a. "Dead Poets Society" is a 1989 American teen drama. It is set in 1959 at the fictional elite conservative Vermont boarding school Welton Academy. **There is strong language, sensual language, and suicide/death topics throughout the novel. We will study the poetry covered in the film in class, and then we will watch the film.

vi. Hamlet

 This Shakespearean play is about the ghost of the King of Denmark telling his son Hamlet to avenge his murder by killing the new king, Hamlet's uncle. **There is strong language, sensual language, and suicide/death topics throughout the novel. We will be watching the film after the novel.

vii. Film Study

a. If time permits, we will be studying different films at the end of the semester that cover all of the topics and themes studied throughout the semester.

- a. Writing is also an essential life skill: my job is to teach you how to become a better writer. Formal essays that count as tests require the following:
 - On-time and complete the day that it is due
 - Typed Double spaced
