
from today that would survive for thousands of years and quite possibly be excavated.

Virtual Field Trip to Peru

n March 16th, elementary World Language students throughout the district participated in a virtual field trip to Peru. Classes joined expert scientist Matias Caillaux, a fisheries specialist for The Nature Conservancy, to explore the Humboldt Current Ecosystem off the coast of Peru while learning about the area's amazing diversity and productivity. It was very exciting to use the Google Hangout platform where students were able to submit questions in real time to Mr. Caillaux. While Peru is most frequently recognized for its rainforests, mountains, and ancient Inca civilizations, it is also home to one of the most productive ocean ecosystems. During this virtual field trip to the western coast of South America, students learned about the Humboldt Current - a cold water current that pushes nutrients from the deepest ocean toward the surface, forming the basis of a unique and abundant ecosystem where a variety of sea birds, flamingos, and even penguins live! Matias traveled by boat through an arid landscape with ancient carvings to an island that is home to more than 30,000 sea lions at a time! Students discovered what's being done to protect this vulnerable ecosystem - so that both people and animals can continue to thrive.

Liberty Students Become Stars with Performances at Walt Disney World Resort over Spring Break



Then, we were invited to Meadow Lakes, a senior living community. There we interviewed 25 residents and spent a wonderful Tuesday evening with some of the most interesting people we ever met. For the next six days we created a Google Slide Deck about our new friends from Meadow Lakes with questions and

pictures. We returned the following Tuesday and presented this to them and had a good amount of laughs while real friendships were made, we connected generations and learned how much we had in common with our new friends. None of us wanted the night to end.

Our final project included each student researching a "cause" near and dear to their hearts. After each presented their project, we voted and picked a new "cause" – *Who Doesn't Love Animals?*. We collected 13 boxes of towels, toys and treats to donate to a dog orphanage right here in Jackson. Each member of our group had a job to do and did it quite well. We asked our teachers to donate extra pencils and erasers they had and these were sold at lunch for 10 and 25 cents. Our goal was to raise \$20 to be used for pet medicine. We surpassed that goal by more than 15 times. Our community went above and beyond.

As you can see, this book club that NEVER read a book, didn't have time to read. They were too busy reaching out to others in need. They made a difference this year!

Our final celebration on the 3rd of May, consisted of rice, hand picked from Rice Lake in Minnesota. Our new friends out there also sent us tea and biscotti to enjoy, as a thank you for making their reading lives much better. So as we say goodbye to our final year in Fifth Grade here at Elms Elementary, we all do it with our heads held high, hearts full, and a wonderful legacy left behind.

As the facilitator of this spontaneous group of do-gooders, I want to thank everyone for the support and the freedom to let these fabulous Fifth Graders think and grow in ways beyond the curriculum. The learning they experienced will certainly prepare them for the opportunities that lie ahead in this great big world of ours.
