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Cupcake Wars and So Much More!

his summer, a group of students from Jackson Liberty and Jackson Memorial High Schools worked together to successfully complete the Jackson Progressing Into Careers Program. The students, referred to as "employees" by the staff, exited the program with a variety of skills and tools needed to obtain a job in the local workforce.

The program was led by teachers Marcus Villeco, Susan Young, and Jennifer Kasyan. Each teacher brought a unique perspective to the program sharing their knowledge of computer, social, vocational, and life skills. The collaboration amongst teachers from different schools within the district helped better meet the needs of our students.

Throughout the program, students researched career interests in order to develop a short term employment goal. Some of the valuable tools the students created include a cover letter, resume, and a completed job application from a local business in hopes of entering the local work community. These documents are saved in each students' Jackson Google account as well as organized in a Portfolio as a hard copy. Many students plan on utilizing their portfolio as they begin the interview process when they enter the local workforce.

The occupational skills portion of the program was lead by a certified Family and consumer Science Teacher, Katherine Chillsczyn. Not only did the students learn hands-on culinary skills through cooperatively prepared nutritious meals twice



a week, they also completed an online culinary course. The course was funded by the District and every student passed the ServSafe test becoming certified as a "Foodhandler". Overall, occupational skills were developed through the integration and teaching of culinary skills, coupled with the ServSafe Certification to make students marketable to the local food service industry.

The students earned awards as incentives that doubled as resume builders, such as Employee of the Week, Chef of the Week, and Perfect Attendance. These incentives boosted student effort, moral, and attendance. The attendance record of the program was above average with half of the students involved earning perfect attendance.

Student progress was monitored through pre and post math, literacy, and culinary tests. In addition, weekly progress reports allowed the students to track their growth and reflect on the progress made towards reaching their personal goals through weekly one to one conferences with teacher supervisors. The Progress Reports doubled as a "timesheet" where students were taught the skill of being responsible "employees" by keeping track of their daily hours by "clocking" in and out of "work".

Students' reflections exhibited their sense of pride and positivity towards their experience with the program. Below are a few quotes...

"This was honestly the best experience I ever had. My relationship with the teachers was amazing. You taught me everything I need to do to become a leader. I will take what I've learned here to get a job." →





"I learned how to cooperate with a team and be a team leader."

"I'm sad I have to leave. I had a lot of fun."

"I learned about finding jobs, resumes, culinary skills and find recipes."

"I loved this program very much. I learned how to cook and to get a job. It was a great experience."

"The program was fun and helpful and I'm glad I took it".

I think I am a good chef. I made 21 cupcakes. Also, the program was awesome and I learned how to cook. I was very fun!"

It was an amazing program. It taught us so much to be prepared for the future. I wish this program lasted longer because these days were not only very helpful for my future but more importantly extremely memorable in every way.

The culminating activity of the program was a Cupcake War Service Learning Project. The students worked collaboratively to construct a cupcake display using creativity and artistic skills that were fostered throughout the program. The students advertised, setup, and managed the sales of the cupcakes at the bake sale. The Jackson Recreation children were invited to vote on their favorite display and purchase cupcakes baked by our students. All proceeds were donated to the Local Foodbank of Ocean County and the grand total raised this year was \$357. The experience demonstrated the importance of giving back to our community. Freeholder, Virginia Haines, a lifelong resident of Ocean County attended the event. "Your program in such an inspiration for those young people."

Overall, this program was very beneficial to the academic, social, and emotional growth of the students involved in the program as they enter the next stage of their life and prepare to enter the local workforce.

McAuliffe School Holds Mock Election for Students and Staff

n Tuesday, November 2nd, McAuliffe students and staff all came together to vote for their candidate for the next President of the United States. In preparation for the election, students studied each of the candidates and ballot questions being presented in their Literacy classes. They also learned about and discussed the Electoral College and its importance in the voting process.

Commercials were created by students that presented information about each of the candidates, the two ballot questions and the history of the Electoral College. All of the commercials were shown on *Wake-Up McAuliffe* each morning during the week prior to the election.







To make the election even more exciting and meaningful, each Literacy class was assigned a state that they would represent for the vote within the Electoral College, that way not only would individual votes be counted, but the Electoral votes would be counted as well. On the day of the election, students came into the library with their classes (states), signed in at the voter registration tables, received their ballots and waited on line to vote for their candidate. The process was exciting for everyone, not only the voters coming in, but the students who were working the voting booths as well!

At the end of the day, the votes were counted and the winners were as follows:

- Ballot Question 1: Should students be required to attend school year-round?
 - Yes: 235
 - No: 641
- □ Ballot Question 2: Should students be permitted to use their cell phones throughout the day during school?
 - Yes: 703
 - No: 177

□ Presidential Voting Outcome:

- Hillary Clinton: Popular Vote (335)/Electoral Votes (152)
- Donald Trump: Popular Vote (426)/Electoral Votes (379)
- Gary Johnson: Popular Vote (60)/Electoral Votes (8)
- Jill Stein: Popular Vote (49)/Electoral Votes (0)

Goetz Students Exercise Their Civic Duty

n November 3rd, the entire Goetz Community exhibited good citizenship and participated in a mock presidential election. Students and staff voted for their choice of President of the United States and also responded to the question of whether standardized tests reflect their knowledge.

The results were 722 votes or 55.9% for Donald Trump; 299 votes or 23.2% for Hillary Clinton; 148 votes for Gary Johnson or 11.5%; and 122 votes or 9.5% for Jill Stein.

The result for the question was 556 or 42.9 % felt that standardized tests do reflect their knowledge and 739 or 57.1% felt that they do not reflect their knowledge.

Additionally, students voted for their favorite book series by choosing *Diary of a Wimpy Kid*, *Harry Potter*, *The Hunger Games*, *Divergent*, or *Pretty Little Liars* books. The winner was *Diary of a Wimpy Kid*.

Most importantly, Goetz students felt the excitement and learned the importance of voting. Special thanks to Mrs. Daton and Ms. Holleran's classes for running the election from signing in voters to monitoring the voting booths.
