Students Start Day with "What I Need" Time

he students in Mrs. Shroyer and Mrs. Zoni's class look forward to their daily WIN or What I Need Time. A new Jackson School District initiative, the "What I Need" or "W.I.N." time block is intended to create a consistent scheduled period of targeted instruction for all learners. It allows time to address targeted skill remediation and enrichment with all learners and to give each child the specific instruction they need right when they need it.

Some options for WIN time may include: shared reading, guided reading, targeted intervention, sight words practice, word attack strategies, vocabulary study, small group writing, fast facts practice, iPads or Chromebooks used for skills support. Mrs. Shroyer and Mrs. Zoni see it as a wonderful way to start the day. The students begin the day excited to practice skills, move around the room and work in small groups, while using fine motor skills, cooperation and problem solving.

Some of the class favorite activities are: poetry, domino fast facts, Chromebooks, science exploring/writing and word building. We thoroughly feel the students in our class benefit from WIN time.

WIN time helps us move toward our goal of an individualized learning plan for our students and providing an approach that makes the most of each child's strengths and helps them to overcome challenges. They are consistently engaged with the skills that reinforce all the necessary objectives that are required for the first grade curriculum.
